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## **Central Basin Attorney Violated Public Records Request Act, Then Withheld Emails**

Emails concern communications between Director Juan Garza and Central Basin attorney Victor Ponto, who has made questionable legal rulings favoring Garza.

Emails from a public records request sent under the Freedom of Information Act by Los Cerritos Community News are being withheld by Central Basin attorney Victor Ponto, with Ponto citing attorney-client privilege as the reason for not producing the emails.

LCCN had requested all emails from or to Director Juan Garza from February 1, 2024 to the present, which at the time was May 25, 2024.

During that time frame, emails were being exchanged concerning two controversial Central Basin audits and GM Alex Rojas' paid administrative leave.

Ponto, who is responsible for answering record requests, violated the FOIA by failing to answer the request in the required ten-day window on June 4.

LCCN emailed on June 4 and received no response; the next FOIA-mandated date to answer was June 18, fourteen days later. LCCN emailed again at that mark and received no response.

Finally, on June 20, after several more emails, LCCN received a response, with Ponto writing as if he had just received the request, once again violating the FOIA.

"The District will determine whether it possesses records responsive to your Request on or before July 3, 2024."

All tolled Ponto would take 38 days to answer what was an easy request; inside sources re-

## **CA. Assembly Committee Approves Bill That Would Kill Cardroom Jobs**

Bill would cut \$500 million in tax revenue statewide; California and local communities would lose \$5.6 billion in economic output and 32,000 good-paying jobs

In 2022, California voters rejected Proposition 26, a ballot measure that would have allowed tribal casinos to run roulette and dice games while dictating the kinds of games the California cardrooms could offer.

The proposition would have likely driven out of business the state's cardrooms, such as The Gardens Casino in Hawaiian Gardens and The Commerce Casino in Commerce.

California cardrooms provide a significant source of tax revenue for city and county general funds and vital tax revenue to the cities for education, public safety, public health, infrastructure, and homelessness.

If Prop. 26 had passed, some cities would been forced to implement draconian cuts or get pushed into bankruptcy. In

Hawaiian Gardens, the Gardens Casino provides 78% of the city's revenue; in Commerce, the Commerce Casino provides 50% of the city's revenue.

But California voters are smart and rejected Prop. 26 by a two-to-one margin, but evidently, State Senator Josh Newman (D-Fullerton) was not one of the smart ones.

Despite the severe economic consequences, Newman last year pushed a bill similar to Prop. 26, Senate Bill 549, the Tribal Declaratory Relief Act of 2023, a hurried gut-and-amend bill that would give sovereign tribal governments a new Private Attorney General Act (PAGA).

SB 549 began as a measure dealing with education, but in June 2023, Newman substituted verbiage - lifted almost word for word from Prop. 26.

California cardrooms legally operate games approved by the Attorney General. Many variations of traditional poker and California games are played. Each game is different, and each one is approved separately.

SB 549 would allow any or all these games to be challenged in court; every game would

have to be adjudicated, meaning the judge would have to analyze the rules and implementation of the game, which could take years and clog the courts.

In a time of record deficits, SB 549 would cut \$500 million in tax revenue statewide; California and local communities would lose \$5.6 billion in economic output generated by cardrooms and 32,000 good-paying jobs that generate \$1.6 billion in wages annually.

According to the California Cardroom Alliance, the economic harm will happen quickly before any litigation is resolved. Filing the lawsuits under PAGA will immediately disrupt banking services while litigation is pending, contending that the

## Supervisors Hahn and Horvath Want to Expand Board to Nine

LOS ANGELES (CNS) - Los Angeles County Supervisors Janice Hahn and Lindsey Horvath unveiled a proposal last Wednesday to revamp county government, wanting to expand the Board of Supervisors from its current five members to nine.

Their proposal would also establish an independent ethics commission and make the county CEO an elected position.

Since the measure requires a change to the County Charter, the proposals will have to be approved by voters. Hahn and Horvath will present the proposal to the full board next week, with the goal of placing it on the November ballot.

"The Los Angeles County government has remained unchanged since 1912, before women had the right to vote and the population was 500,000," according to a statement released by the supervisors announcing the proposals. "Today, five elected supervisors serve the most populous county in the nation, each representing 2 million constituents. Now is the time to reform Los Angeles County's form of government to be responsive to our region's greatest challenges."

The proposals also include a commission that would review the county Charter every 10 years, creation of a Department of Budget and Management and a County Legislative Analyst, annual open departmental budget hearings and creation of a task force to oversee the implementations of the changes.

"We can no longer let a dated bureaucracy prevent us from more effectively addressing our homelessness crisis, making real progress on justice reform, or actualizing a government where Angelenos can meaningfully be at the decision-making table," according to the supervisors' statement. "Reform has been studied for decades -- the time to act is now. This is the change our communities have called for and now voters have an opportunity to bring Los Angeles County into the 21st Century this November."

Other possibilities suggested in the motion included:

- an extended process allowing more time for public review of proposed motions that go before the board for a vote, sometimes within days of being published;
- a procedure for routinely evaluating the county charter, county codes and board "parliamentary processes";
- a review of the county's budgeting process with an eye toward increasing "efficiency, transparency and equitable outcomes"; and

The concept of expanding the board has surfaced repeatedly over the years but it has never gained traction. Voters have rejected the idea on eight different occasions.

But Hahn and Supervisor Hilda Solis both advocated strongly during the February 2023 meeting for a renewed exploration of the idea.

"There was a time that five supervisors made sense," Hahn said. "When my father (Kenneth Hahn) was elected in 1952, the county's population was just over 4 million."

But Hahn noted that each of the five supervisors now represent roughly 2 million people. She said her district includes 32 individual cities, along with unincorporated areas. And the vast sizes of the districts has led to challenges in ensuring proper representation for all ethnic communities, some of which are overwhelmed in districts of 2 million people.

Hahn acknowledged the repeated rejection of similar efforts by voters in the past, but said last year she is "hopeful it will be different" this time.

## **Lakewood's Newest Utility Box Project Will Salute Veterans**

Lakewood has a new project to beautify many of the utility boxes at intersections around town. The city is designing and installing wrap-around murals that blend neighborhood-focused historical photographs, generally in black and white, with colorful images of the vibrant, diverse community that is Lakewood today. In this way, Lakewood's past and present will be woven together.

Called "Lakewood Then and Now," the project is part of the celebration of the city's 70th anniversary of incorporation.

Lakewood Then and Now is unrolling in phases. The first utility box was installed in late May, at the corner of Clark Avenue and South Street, with a Mayfair Park and Pan Am Fiesta theme. Lakewood has about 50 of these utility boxes, so new murals will be installed in stages in the months and years ahead until all of them have become reminders of the city's past and present. The murals are made


of a durable material and protected by an anti-graffiti coating.

Just in time for the July 4th holiday, the newest design announced will recognize military veterans, who were a major part of the initial population of Lakewood and who continue to be honored by the community for their service.

The design will be installed on a utility box at Woodruff Avenue and Centralia Street, close to Del Valle Park, and will feature images of the park's jet plane, veterans memorial, military veterans, Lakewood High School JROTC cadets, and a Rosie the Riveter Douglas Aircraft employee from the 1940s.

The design of each mural includes a unique QR code that links to a page on the city's website. The page captions the photos in that mural and provides historical notes about the surrounding neighborhood. The Del Valle Park area mural is expected to be installed in a few weeks, and the webpage for it will be available at that time.

games are not legal. This will impact cities, 30,000 cardroom employees, and the large and small business owners who sell goods or provide services to cardrooms.

Despite Prop. 26 losing by a 2-1 margin, and all the bad economic and job data, California Assembly's Governmental Organization Committee, Chaired by Asm. Blanca Rubio (D-West Covina), voted 15-1 to move Senate Bill 549, out of comittee and to the Assembly Approriations Committee, dealing a blow to privately owned cardrooms in California.

Chair Rubio and Vice-Chair Tom Lackey (D-Palmdale) took the low road, registering "Not Voting" on the roster, as did Mike Gipson (D-Gardena), who has private cardrooms in his district.

The bill now moves to the Asm. Appropriations Committee.

Keith Sharp, President of the California Cardroom Alliance told Los Cerritos Community News, "We are disappointed with the Assembly Governmental Organization Committee's decision to prioritize the interests of wealthy tribal casinos over the livelihoods of tens of thousands of Californians who depend on cardroom jobs and the cities that rely on this revenue. SB 549 poses serious risks to these communities by allowing tribal nations to sue law-abiding California businesses without granting these businesses similar legal protections. This imbalance threatens the local economies supported by cardrooms. Despite facing a \$9 billion industry, we remain committed to advocating for our jobs and communities."

veal LCCN that emails on CB's system can be searched and found very quickly.

But not all emails were produced with Ponto citing attorney-client privilege. Attorney-client privilege typically applies to confidential communications between an attorney and their client made for the purpose of obtaining or providing legal advice. In the context of a public agency, the "client" is usually the agency itself rather than any individual board member.

But the privilege is likely moot; at the time of the emails, Ponto was CB General Manager, rendering all emails open to a records request, yet Ponto wants to produce only some.

LCCN emailed all CB Board members, along with Ponto and Lopes, without a response.

Where is the L.A. District Attorney?

As for Ponto, this was not his first foray into allowing illegal public agency votes.

LCCN published an investigative article last week outlining how Ponto was jumping from different public agency roles from 2023 to '24, like Leonard DiCaprio in the Steven Spielberg movie Catch Me If You Can.

And when Ponto was hired by an agency, Brown Act and Government Code violations soon followed, just like at CB.

Illegal Vote 1:

In Feb. 2019, the Adelanto City Council, with Ponto as its attorney, placed City Manager Jessie Flores on paid administrative leave pending the results of an internal investigation.

The move was done in closed session with a non-agendized vote, as reported by the Victorville Daily Press.

Ponto later informed the public that the Flores item was an emergency walk-on, requiring immediate action without notice. Ponto did not provide a reason for the council's decision regarding Flores.

The VDP criticized Ponto's actions, and two council members informed the VDP that they had no knowledge the vote on Flores' was scheduled.

Flores was eventually rehired in an open session. In contrast to when Ponto placed Flores on leave in a closed session, he did not announce that the discussion to reinstate Flores was an emergency walk-on

Illegal Vote 2:

The Flores vote was exactly the scenario Ponto used to hire Central Basin's current GM Elaine Jeng, who, in emails obtained by LCCN, has made it very clear will not abide by chain-of-command rules, already making decisions that are clearly under Board purview.

At a May 2024 Central Basin Special Meeting, Ponto allowed Directors Juan Garza and Martha Camacho Rodriguez to walk on a non-agendized item to hire Jeng.

Just like Adelanto, and Monday's Garza motion to remove Chacon, Ponto defended his decision by calling it an emergency walk on item; this time Garza had enough votes and they hired Jeng.

In addition to the Brown Act violations, Ponto's maneuvers at Adelanto and Central Basin violated Government Code 54956 which states, "any action to approve the contract of a local agency executive [Jeng] must be taken at a regular board meeting and cannot be approved at a special meeting of the board.'

Illegal Vote to Hire Ponto:

Prior to becoming Central Basin's attorney in December 2023, Ponto was already putting a lot of miles on his car as California City's attorney; "Cal City" is near Mojave City about 120 miles north of Los Angeles off the 14 freeway.

Like Adelanto, Ponto's hiring at Cal City occurred under a cloud. Ponto had "been asked to leave" from his position at Los Angeles-based Olivarez Madruga so

he moved to Burke, Williams, Sorensen – taking his paying clients with him – and was then hired by the City Council.

The Cal City's Council vote to hire Ponto was finalized in a special meeting violating the Brown Act. The Mojave Desert News wrote, "an executive position selected to the city attorney must be approved by the City Council in open session at a regular meeting."

According to the Mojave Desert News, one councilmember said she felt the city was being used as a bargaining chip for the revenue coming with Ponto and that the move was due to the Ponto changing from Olivarez to Burke.

Just a few weeks later, in January 2024, Ponto was appointed as interim City Manager for Cal City when City Manager Michele Martinez resigned citing "concerns for her safety due to threats from outside influencers.'

Similar to the Cal City Council, Ponto was hired in December 2023 under a cloud at Central Basin. After a new board majority led by the now-retired Michael Gualtieri and current Director Juan Garza inexplicably fired Bob Baker, who had guided the agency competently, they hired Ponto.

Illegal vote 4:

Just weeks later, like he did at Adelanto, Ponto sanctioned an illegal vote to place then-GM Rojas on leave. Under Central Basin's Administrative Code, the vote required a 4/5ths majority of the board and 6 out of 7 votes under Rojas' personal employment contract; neither vote number was met.

Yet, just like he did with the hiring of Jeng, Ponto ruled the vote numbers were lawful, allowed the vote, and placed Rojas on leave. Then-President Michael Gualtieri then immediately led the charge to appoint Ponto as Central Basin General Manager.

At that time, Ponto was City Manager, General Manager and General Counsel at three different public agencies.

## **Lakewood Equestrian Center** in Danger of Closing

More than 100 horses are in danger of being displaced, including some that are too old to be moved and would need to be euthanized, after Lakewood announced it could no longer afford to run the Lakewood Equestrian Center.

But after three hours of input from a capacity crowd of the center's supporters, the council decided to take one more stab at finding a way to keep it open.

The Center is a 19-acre holdover before the post-World War II economic boom paved the way for urbanization with mass-produced houses.

The Center also houses miniature horses and some mules. Some of the horses are old and have been retired, while others are used for training.

Part of the land the equestrian center sits on is owned by the county. Another portion is owned by SCE.

The city has announced plans to wipe the equestrian center out and build a park with pickleball courts.

The City Council halted their vote on the issue to give people more time to come up with a proposal for taking it over, but the facility needs at least \$6 million in repairs and SCE is owed more than \$40,000 on the lease.

"We have nowhere else to go," Noah Grove, who boards his animals at the facility, told KTLA's Jennifer McGraw. "Huntington Beach Equestrian Center, they are full and have a 35-horse waitlist. I'm actually from Huntington Beach.

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## Double the Benefit of Every Gardening Task

ou can double the benefit of every gardening task while keeping your garden looking its best. You'll reduce your workload, help your landscape flourish, and have more time to enjoy its beauty.

Don't spend time and energy bagging and hauling landscape trimmings to the recycling center. Put it to work in your garden.

Use shredded leaves, evergreen needles, herbicide-free grass clippings, or other pest- and weed-free organic material as mulch.

Spread a one-to-two-inch layer of these materials over the soil around annual and perennial flowers and vegetables.

Spreading organic mulch over the soil surface helps conserve moisture, suppress weeds, moderate soil temperatures, protect the soil during heavy rains, and improve the soil as it breaks down.

Besides all these benefits you'll be burning calories and strengthening your muscles

Convert larger tree and shrub trimmings into wattle fences, arbors, or plant supports

Or chip them into mulch to spread around trees and shrubs or as pathways throughout the landscape.

You don't need to buy a chipper but may want to team up with your neighbors to rent one.

Maintain a two-to-three-inch layer of mulch around these plants. Keep the mulch away from the tree trunks and crowns of the plants.

Still more landscape trimmings? Start a compost pile if your municipality allows it. Transform plant-based kitchen scraps and landscape trimmings into a valuable soil amendment. Do not add meat, fat, or bones that can attract rodents.

Avoid adding weeds gone to seed, perennial weeds like quackgrass and bindweed, and plants infected with disease or insects. Most gardeners do not compost at high enough temperatures to kill these organisms, so they get added back to the garden with the compost.

Compost is good for the environment and helps build healthy soil more equipped to retain moisture, provide nutrients, and help suppress some plant diseases and insect pests.

MULCH is good for the environment and helps build healthy soil more equipped to retain moisture, provide nutrients, and help suppress some plant diseases and insect pests.



**USE SHREDDED LEAVES,** evergreen needles, herbicide-free grass clippings, or other pest- and weed-free organic material as mulch.

Continue growing lawn grass tall and mowing high as long as your grass is actively growing.

Taller grass is more likely to outcompete the weeds and forms deeper roots making it more drought tolerant.

Minimize the stress by removing no more than a third of the total grass height each time you mow.

Improve your lawn's appearance, save time, and use fewer resources with sharp mower blades.

You can mow faster with sharpened blades and your mower will consume up to 22% less fuel. Lawns will also use up to 30% less water.

Sharp mower blades make a clean cut that is less noticeable plus the wound closes quickly, helping you grow a healthy better-looking lawn. Leave the clippings on the lawn. They add nutrients, moisture, and organic matter to the soil. A season's worth of clippings equals one fertilizer application so every time you mow you are fertilizing the lawn and improving the soil.

Finish every garden chore with a bit of cleanup. Sweep clippings, plant debris, and fertilizer off walks, drives, and patios, so it won't wash into the storm sewer. Keeping plant debris out of our waterways is good for us and the environment.

Torres has been pulling double duty for the Pioneers as she has been a strength in the circle as one of the top pitchers of the 605 League in addition to swinging a hot bat. As a junior, Torres batted .446, had 33 hits, 23 runs batted in, scored 16 runs and was walked 13 times. This past season, she was second on the team with a .448 average, scored 29 times, had 25 RBI and

smacked a team-high seven home runs. In the circle, she went 9-6 for a team that finished 13-8-1, the third straight season the Pioneers won at least 10 games. Torres was also the league's Most Valuable Pitcher.

Last summer, Torres led the So Cal Athletics with a .405 average, had 17 hits and was walked 10 times and in 15 games played this summer, she is batting .393 with 11 hits, three of which for extra bases, has nine RBI and just as many runs scored and has drawn 11 walks. In 28 at-bats, she has struck out just once.

"Maya, on her pitching, needed to work harder," said Blanck. "And then I needed her to concentrate on every pitch. That was hard to do sometimes in the 605 League because some of the teams aren't as strong. And she can play anywhere on the infield."

Torres, who will be playing at Whittier College, said her time at Artesia has been 'pretty fun' and she had an idea of what to expect and what it was going to be like after watching her older sister, Charlene Fregoso, don the red and black from 2017-2020.

"I tried to work as hard as I can to be able to help my high school team," said Torres. "I wanted us to get far in [the playoffs this past season] and make a name for ourselves. We didn't exactly get far, but we definitely made a name for ourselves these past couple of years."

Soto batted .449 as a junior with 35 hits, 27 RBI, and 23 runs but led the Pioneers with 27 RBI this past season. She also scored 28 runs, which was second on the team and was second last summer with a .357 average and scored 10 runs. Soto was a 605 League first team member this past season.

"I've gone through a lot with her as far as high school, getting her eligible to play," said Blanck. "Then this year...wow, she finally matured and got everything going. She played behind the plate and at third base. Hitting-wise, she led in RBI's and

had very solid hits. With her, it was like, 'aww, I didn't get a good hit'. But I would tell her she had two RBI. I worked with her on that aspect of the game, which is going to...I'm telling you, [Orange Coast Community College], where she's going to go, is going to be so happy when they get her."

"Memorable, to say the least," said Soto of her time at Artesia. "I think the memories of the team have been the greatest part of my whole softball experience. I loved our roster and all the girls...we just played together so nicely. We knew how to communicate well because we had that communication on and off the field. It was great."

Medina, who admitted she wished she had one more year with Soto and Torres, shined as a sophomore when she batted

.474, had 36 hits, scored 41 runs, was walked 18 times and stole 22 bases. This past season, she was third on the team with a .414 average and 34 runs. Her patience at the plate was nearly spot on as she drew 24 walks and stole another 22 bases. She too was a 605 League first team member.

"Alea didn't have any confidence in herself," Blanck recalls. "I kept giving her positive feedback. It took me a year to get her on my travel ball team because she didn't think she was good enough for my travel ball team. I kept telling her, 'yes, you're going to be my starting outfielder'. Finally, it took a lot of talking and then she came out and as you can tell, she has that positive attitude and it's getting stronger and stronger now that she's [going to be]

a senior. Her aggressiveness at bat and stealing bases is awesome."

"We've been knowing this was going to happen," said Medina of the others graduating last month. "I do feel like I'm being left behind, but we've had good times together. I'm just making sure not to take any of these weekends for granted and just looking forward to the rest of the [summer] with them.

"It's been amazing," she continued on her Artesia career. "I grew up playing with these girls, so we all clicked immediately. The bond was there from the beginning."

In 15 games this summer, Medina is batting a solid .406 with 13 hits, has scored 15 runs and has drawn 10 walks. She leads the So Cal Athletics with eight walks. Blanck said he saw a growth and maturity when the three came to Artesia in the fall of 2020 (2021 for Medina).

"As a high school coach, I gave them roles of responsibility and held them accountable for who they were responsible for," said Blanck. "So, like Vanessa, she's a catcher and she worked with the catchers In that aspect, teaching the junior varsity catchers how to block, how to throw. Maya, I used as a pitcher to show the j.v. girls how to pitch and the other girls on varsity who came in."

As far as Torres being held accountable for the pitchers early in her high school career, she said it wasn't too much of a surprise.

"I've done that before, and it was pretty nice being able to help my teammates," said Torres. "I knew I was up for the expectation because I had already known some of the pitchers."

"At first, I never interpreted myself as being a leader," said Soto. "I knew I was one of the ones who was able to pump up the girls when needed and I knew that I was that person who could get their energy up."

He added that Medina was accountable for the outfielders and taught them how to throw the ball and how to run angles.

"It honestly made me feel good and it just made feel like leader on the team," said Medina. "Being as young as I was, it helped me with my confidence a lot. My freshman year, I was playing on a different travel ball team, the USA Athletics, and I wasn't playing. I was on the bench every single game. So, going into my freshman year, I had nothing because I wasn't playing.

"It was a rough start for me, but throughout the season, it got a lot easier because Coach Ed knew the type of player I was," she continued. "He just helped me build up that confidence again. He made me the player I am now."

If having Medina, Soto and Torres on the So Cal Athletics wasn't enough, two more recent Artesia graduates are also on the team. Irma Gonzalez, who batted .363, scored 25 runs and had 18 RBI and Melissa Mendoza, who was fourth in average (.393), had 18 RBI and scored 18 runs, have been vital for the Pioneers and the So Cal Athletics. Torres, who has known Gonzalez for a long time, said she knew all five of them would be at the same high school, but as far as being teammates for the So Cal Athletics, that was kind of a coincidence, but not exactly a surprise, in her words.

"Irma was another one that didn't have confidence in herself," said Blanck. "I had to keep reminding her how good she was. When she finally started believing it, then those RBI's would come up. She batted second in my lineup [at Artesia] and she was part of Alea scoring. I could sacrifice her because she was also fast. If I could get those two on, I know I'm going to get a run."

But still, Medina, Soto and Torres have been the backbone of the program and have been the most prolific trio the Pioneers have seen in at least a quarter of a century.

"I've been playing with Vanessa since the sixth grade, so we've been together for awhile now," said Torres. "And Alea, I've known since my second [recreation] ball team. So, we've already had that bond coming into high school and I knew they were both reliable players that I could count on. If I needed them, they would be there, not just for me, but for the entire

"I was not expecting to come to [the So Cal Athletics] coming into high school," said Medina. "But I think knowing that I had girls from high school coming to this team made it a lot easier of a decision, and I don't regret that decision. I love that we brought more girls to the team."

Blanck, who is in his 70s, leaves
Artesia with a 45-35-1 record and of the
10 head coaches the program has had since
1998, he is the only one with a winning record. It should be noted that in the past 27
seasons, the Pioneers have had five seasons
in which they were above .500. His 45 victories are second behind ex-Artesia great
Dayna Coleman (Feenstra), who compiled
a 59-67 mark over seven seasons.

The reason Blanck is leaving Artesia is because he retired from his profession five years ago to coach the Pioneers and remain in softball. He had also been involved with the Artesia Punishers travel organization for many years before joining forces with Tim Rivera, who was also involved with the Punishers.

"I want to start enjoying my retirement, not that coaching high school was not fun," he chuckled. "I had a great time coaching it; I wanted to experience that. When I retired, I wanted to coach high school. Well, I did it and now I'm 71 and I want to enjoy my RV."

"Coach Ed had been asking me since my freshman year to join the So Cal Athletics," Soto recalled. "I was still stuck with my other [travel] team, the (Buena Park) Orange County Strikeforce and I was little hesitant because he had an 18-Under team, and I didn't know if I was ready for that. But I got to play with the girls and honestly, I don't regret any decisions I've made because this team is great and the coaches are great."

Blanck admitted he almost stayed one more season because of Medina. But, his daughter, who played for the Punishers in the early 2000s, is moving to South Carolina and needs her father to help her with the cross-country move. Blanck also has four grandchildren out that way, so as he put it, 'it's a perfect time where I'm going to go help with my family'.

"They are the best kids I've ever coached," said Blanck. "When great athletes like them respect you and listen to you and pay attention and do what you ask, what can you expect? These girls are going to be achievers in college and they're going to be awesome."

The So Cal Athletics are hoping to land a spot in the Premier Girls Fastpitch National Championships later this month. Blanck is also hoping to get Medina signed to a college, which she has already been looked at by several institutions.

Now, with most of the core group having graduated and Blanck retiring from coaching, it's up to Medina and soon to be senior Kaleyse Foster to be the focal point of the Pioneers so they can pass the torch off to next season's underclassmen.

"Me and Kaleyse had said that if my sister [assistant coach and former Artesia standout Alyssa Medina] wasn't coaching, that we weren't going to play softball anymore because Coach Ed is an amazing coach," said Medina. "He built up that program. It's hard, but we made the decision that we're going to keep playing; we're going to finish it out because you just can't stop. We want to keep the program going, keep building it up and make those [underclassmen] keep the program going."

# TRAVEL SOFTBALL UPDATE: Area athletes wrapping up TCIC, more playing in another prestigious tournament
